

Demystifying the Peninsula

The Mornington Peninsula Shire has 192kms of wonderful coastline surrounding the 70% that is Green Wedge and has 42 townships. There are 164,000 residents and also those that own property but live in other areas.

We have a \$7.4 billion economy, including a \$1.2 billion food bowl, mainly feeding Melbourne.

We have 7 million annual visitors and are known for our picturesque and wealthy areas.

But all is not as it seems.

We have an older population with a higher proportion of people over 65 (24%) than anywhere else in greater Melbourne. Many are low income pensioners. Many have disabilities.

Some of our areas are above the state average for unemployment with youth unemployment as high as 13% - the national average is 9.6%.

Average family weekly income is much lower than the rest of the country resulting in severe socio economic disadvantage, with some townships in the lowest percentile in Australia.

We have shockingly poor public transport. 83% of the Peninsula has no public transport, resulting in only 3% of residents using the few available bus routes.

If you are disabled, young, elderly or without a car your opportunities are limited in getting to school, shopping centres, sport, work or medical centres.

Isolation is common and high levels of depression the result.

We have almost no light industrial land available to create jobs yet 3,500 hectares of special use industrial zoned land has sat idle for 50 years near Hastings. The Council is advocating for some of this land to be used for a job creating marine light industrial precinct.

Many of our underlying problems haven't been addressed as politicians have had the luxury of safe seats on the Mornington Peninsula.

Political commitments and election promises have largely by-passed the Mornington Peninsula until now. What a difference close elections can make.

Perhaps now we will be in a realistic position to resolve these problems so that more of our residents can fully enjoy living on the Mornington Peninsula.

Save Westernport

"AGL CEO Meets Save Westernport - Gas Project Is Delayed"

After the huge turnout for the MayDay SOS Westernport public meeting in Balnarring, Save Westernport continues to put pressure on AGL to withdraw its proposal to import liquified natural gas (LNG) at Crib Point jetty.

On 12th June 2019, Save Westernport supporters travelled by bus to Melbourne to meet AGL CEO Brett Redman in person. Brett Redman was a guest presenter at the 2019 Australian Energy Week Conference 11-14 June at the Melbourne Conference and Exhibition Centre.

Save Westernport President Louise Page and Environment Victoria CEO Jono La Nauze met with Brett Redman and reminded him that our communities on the Mornington Peninsula are overwhelmingly opposed to the AGL gas project and 56km pipeline to Pakenham. A letter from 10-year-old Dashi Roller was presented to Mr. Redman along with a signed letter from Federal Member for Flinders Greg Hunt MP to express the concerns and disappointment felt by local residents about the proposed AGL gas project.

Outside the meeting, Save Westernport and Environment Victoria supporters marched towards the conference carrying large banners and chanting to draw attention to our fight to oppose AGL's plans.



Arriving at the Energy Week Conference, the Save Westernport supporters were hoping to meet AGL CEO Brett Redman in person, but this did not eventuate. Instead, Louise Page presented a "Brett Redman" stand-in with a large petition of over 17,000 signatures with each person's name written in small text on the banner. Many thanks to the local residents who awoke early and travelled on a cold day to Melbourne – your support of Save Westernport is always very much appreciated!



On Friday 28th June 2019, AGL provided an update to the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX) stating that the Crib Point gas project would be delayed and another FSRU vessel (Hoegh Esperanza) had been selected in order to meet operational requirements arising from the Environment Effects Statement (EES) process.

This announcement by AGL confirmed that the original plan to import LNG (using an "open-loop system" that would require up to 450 million litres per day of fresh seawater and then discharge chilled, chlorinated, sterile water back into Westernport Bay) was a flawed proposal and would fail to meet strict environmental regulations.

Save Westernport has always stated that AGL's gas import project was not viable and would pollute Westernport Bay, harm marine life, create air quality and noise issues, fire and

safety issues and have negative social impacts on local residents of Crib Point and visitors to Westernport Bay.

The Herald-Sun newspaper, The Age, Western Port News and other media outlets reported on AGL's delay announcement - some featuring large photos of Save Westernport supporters standing firm against AGL.

Save Westernport will be meeting local, State and Federal politicians over coming weeks to voice our concerns about AGL's project, ensure the EES process is thorough and fully scrutinises each component of this gas import terminal project and highlight the growing community opposition to AGL's project. We will also be meeting with more local community groups to spread our message and have begun plans to ramp up our campaign with more events coming soon!

Regarding the dysfunctional Australian gas market, more people are finally realising that importing gas will actually lead to higher gas prices. Here is a recent report from The Age:

Bruce Robertson, an investment analyst with the Institute for Energy Economics and Financial Analysis, argued the project was unjustifiable both on economic and environmental grounds.

"It is extremely expensive and energy intensive to liquefy gas, and if you have one environmental bone in your body it's an abomination," Mr Robertson said. The process of liquefying natural gas emits significantly more greenhouse gases than piping it conventionally. Mr Robertson also argued it made no economic sense for Australia to import gas, given it exports almost twice as much natural gas as it consumes domestically. "Importing gas is possibly the most wasteful thing you could do in terms of energy – it's just pure wasted energy on a massive scale," Mr Robertson said.

Another recent issue in Westernport Bay was the arrival of the 21,000-tonne gas drilling rig Ocean Monarch. Anchored offshore from Cowes and visible from all directions, the large drill rig required maintenance work to lower hull tanks in the shallow waters off Phillip Island.

The Ocean Monarch had travelled from Hobart's Derwent River where its owners refused to allow inspections for marine pests. The Tasmanian Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) issued an Environmental Protection Notice on "... the basis that the oil rig activity may cause serious or material environmental harm or environmental nuisance."

Salmon company Tassal expressed concerns with the EPA about potential biosecurity risks from the Ocean Monarch such as marine pests.

Save Westernport's Louise Page wrote to local Member for Flinders Greg Hunt MP to seek assurances that the Ocean Monarch would not introduce marine pests into Westernport Bay. A letter from Victorian Minister for Agriculture Jaclyn Symes MP was received that confirmed the Ocean Monarch had been inspected before leaving Tasmania and that "... the inspections did not detect any marine pests and the rig was deemed not to have an unacceptable biosecurity risk." We hope that remains the case.

There is clear access to the hydrant;

There is a marker post;

The marker post is painted;

There is a blue reflective road marker;

There is no vegetation over the hydrant; and

DO NOT park over the hydrant.

For safety reasons please DO NOT clean inside the hydrant cover.

It is an offence for any person to remove or damage a marker post or hydrant.

Any person caught damaging or removing a marker post or hydrant could face criminal damage charges.

If you see someone damaging a hydrant or marker post please call the Police or the Mornington Peninsula Shire to report the matter.

IN HONOUR OF ...

When the First World War dragged to a close and the 'Anzacs' came home, most communities throughout Australia honoured the young soldiers from their area by having a display board made on which their names were listed. Balnarring was no different. The Progress Association nominated a special committee that organised the Welcome Homes for each soldier. The soldier received a gold medal and a framed, hand-lettered "Address of Welcome Home" at a special function attended by the whole community. The money raised went towards the cost of an Honour Board and the remainder was raised by public subscription. A design was chosen, names tendered. The first preference for the board (chosen from a catalogue of designs) was not suitable as there were too few names and an alternate design was accepted. The cost was £30 including packaging and delivery to the station. The Board was unveiled by Major Balmain at a special function held in the (old) Balnarring Hall in November 26th 1920. The Honour Board now hangs in the foyer of the present hall. Of the twenty-seven names listed, several bear an asterisk. These men gave their lives.

Fast forward almost a century. At the Villers-Bretonneux Military Cemetery in Northern France, adjacent to the Australian National Memorial, is the newly opened Sir John Monash Centre. This is an interpretative, interactive centre where visitors can be immersed in the battlefields and in the lives of ordinary Australians who were caught up in the fighting. On display is an Honour Board representative of those that small communities throughout Australia raised as a tribute to their young soldiers. This Board is 'our' Board, the Balnarring Board or rather a replica of it. It was chosen partly because of its size and shape but also because the maker, Robert Prenzel of Sth Yarra, used Australian timber in its construction and Australian iconography in its design. It has gum leaves, nuts and blossom as decorative features on the wooden frame.

The next time you are in the Hall, stop to admire the craftsmanship and pause to think that, in Villers-Bretonneux, some visitor there is looking at the exact same thing.

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Bundjil Nest Project (reconciliation in action) Update

The Bundjil Nest project involves Balnarring preschool, primary school and early learning centre, as well as St Joseph's primary school, Capel Sounds Early learning centre and kindercare family day care. Together we develop projects and learning that brings First Peoples perspectives to the educational programs.

This year we are focusing on the water ways, in particular how rubbish dropped on land ends up in the water ways. Boon Wurrung Elders Carolyn Briggs and Fay Stewart-Muir taught us that in Boon Wurrung stories, waang (black raven) protects the water ways.

We have been teaching the children about the impact of plastics on the water ways which has involved collecting flexible plastics both from our homes and during a Balnarring Beach and Bush clean-up day.



In June a small group (50) of community members gathered on Civic Reserve to hear Sea Shepherd representatives — Demmi and Nikki Noordennen and REPLAS representative Kelvin Agg- speak on the importance of caring for the environment and sustainable options for flexible plastics.

We then went off in groups to collect rubbish from the beach and the area around the preschool and skate park. In forty-five minutes we collected 110kg of rubbish!!!!! Some of the items collected were: vacuum head, leaf blower, bricks, bike, 80 glass bottles, 75 aluminium cans, 20 pieces of clothing, 50 straws, 3 metres of fishing line, and seven kilos of flexible plastic.

Thank you to all for your effort.

The flexible plastics we collected have been taken to REPLAS to be made into planks of hard recycled plastic. In August the children are working with artist, Emma Davis, to create their own waangs. Emma will then use the inspirations from the children to create several waang sculptures from the planks. The waangs will be placed around Bundjil's Nest in Robertson Park, Balnarring Beach.

A community event will be held on Friday 25th October when dancers will perform and the sculptures will be revealed.





Sorting the rubbish collected on the clean-up day

Our discussions are now focused on how are we reducing plastic in our homes? Some thoughts are: Take re-useable bags to all places you shop; Use nude for lunch boxes and snacks not processed pre-packaged goods; buy loose vegetables and fruit not pre-packaged; take flexible plastics to collection places; say no to straws; use bubbles instead of balloons; take own containers when buying take away. 

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
Trust for Nature is delighted at the MP Councils move to permanently protect 2 of the most important sites on the Mornington Peninsula with Trust for Nature covenants. Mornington Peninsula Shire owns portions of Warringine Park and the whole of 92 Elizabeth Ave, Capel Sound (the latter is part of Tootgarook Swamp). These efforts by the council means that over 130 hectares of some of the Peninsula's most engendered species and communities will be protected forever. Species such as the Australasian Bittern, Swamp Skink, White-footed Dunnart, Lewins Rail and Leafy Twig-sedge are now protected forever. In addition to these species wetlands of both Tootgarook and Westernport Bay will be protected and buffered from future climate impacts. The Mornington Peninsula Shire has been leading the way in conservation actions by permanently preserving some of the Peninsulas most unique and diverse habitats and has indicated they plan to complete more efforts to ensure a healthy and sustainable Mornington Peninsula. I would describe this as a great outcome for conservation. Trust for Nature has received funding from the Limb Foundation through the Bays and Islands project and the State Government to be able to place the covenants on title. TFN are looking for more private landholders who have conservation values are interested in protecting their properties in perpetuity, the MP Shire Council has set a great example for people to get involved. In July two of our members will address the club on topics as diverse as the introduction of electric cars into Australia, Quaker Services and aspects of life in Cambodia.


Day trips have been organised to the Walter & Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research, Hart Marine in Mornington and the RAAF Museum at Point Cook.

Pat The Mac tips: Printing to PDF on iOS.

If the title does not mean anything to you, it is probably not necessary for you to read this article. However, if you are intrigued by it, just read further how to use one of most useful and hidden tricks in iOS. This function has become available since iOS 10.

If you wish to convert a document to a PDF document, the trick is to use the share key... I'll assume that we want to create a copy of a photo to PDF... Open your Photo app and choose the picture:

Picture	Explanation
Û	1) Find the share icon Depending on the app, it may be in any of the four corners (that's Apple lack of interface consistency for you)
Print	2) On the bottom line of grey icons, look for the Print icon and touch it
"I have two mommies. I know where the apostrophe goes."	3) When the picture appears, touch it with two fingers and gesture as if you wanted to extend the picture (look at the arrows on the left picture) (and read the punch line, I find it rather funny!)
<u></u>	4) The picture will reappear bigger on the screen and the share icon will show again at the top right. Touch it.
Message Mail Add to Notes to Copy Save to Piles Shortcuts Save to Crepber	5) A list of locations as to where to save the PDF will appear Scroll across them to decide where to save the file. You can for example save it to iBook, make a copy, email it straight away or send it as a message.

Due to the Volunteer Appreciation Day at Healesville Sanctuary on May25th the bush maintenance team toiled in Woodland Break on Sunday May 26th instead. Six of us did a good job in removing more of the seemingly never-ending forest of pittosporum, a large number bearing fruit.

Two young visitors who accompanied their grandparents had a lovely time creating cubbies in the fallen pitto trees. The weather was most pleasant even though rain had been forecast that day. Rain from previous days made pitto pulling relatively easy; however, we began moving into larger trees that needed more vigorous hand-saw work. In the future some will be left for Parks to tackle with a chainsaw.

Gorse (*Ulex europaeus*) was becoming evident as the team pushed northward. Some of the gorse, taller than our heads, took some dealing with, though not before spreading seeds from which sprang new plants. Seed bearing boneseed (*Chrysanthemoides* monilifera) was becoming evident too in this area, and something else to be considered.

Saturday June 29th was to be the next bush working bee but due to rain the day was called off at the last minute with many of the team breathing a sigh of relief. They were then able to direct their activities to drier conditions.

As seems to be the norm on the roads surrounding Devilbend more rubbish had been dumped on Hodgins Rd. It's such a shame that such a lovely area is so mistreated. Our shire has put some effort into repairing vehicle damage on the corner of Graydens and Derril Roads and hopefully it remains repaired. This particular corner which once had a vast array of native vegetation had it destroyed by vehicle abuse.

A small success on the turtle front was the hatching of two live babies. One dead and one partially hatched, but dead, were at a nest that had been trodden on by a deer, judging by the hoof print. My, they are tiny things, which is to be expected considering the size of the egg!

Waterwatch was postponed in May due to lack of water or at least accessible water without becoming bogged when attempting to collect samples for testing.

The conductivity changed during the dry period and we used our test meter to measure the conductivity, or salt content, of the water.

Normally the conductivity at Bittern would be about 1080uS/cm (microsiemens).

The level of water dropped and the conductivity rose to 4800uS/cm and after the rainfall conductivity dropped to 4100uS/cm. Therefore rapid changes occur after rain. Extended periods of high salt content would likely have an effect on the aquatic life and plants. After sufficient rain it should eventually return to normal. The monthly monitoring records any unusual readings and is passed on to Melbourne Water and Parks Vic for their database.



The June Waterwatch was on the 19th in on and off drizzle. Four of us braved the conditions and collected water from each site. A bonus sighting was a casual koala in a tree near WW site 2 at Devilbend. The catch drain had water in it at both reservoirs; a vast change from April. However, not enough rain had fallen for Devilbend Creek to show any sign of activity at our end. Eastern Common Froglets (*Crinia* signifera) along the catch drain and shorelines called happily with the increased water levels in their habitat.


